The Prediction of January.



The fyrte daye of Januarie at
noone shalbe the last quarter,
at 47 degrees of Libra, which
shal be of meane temperaūce,
but the colde shal be so behe-
ment that one maye not abide
it: we shalbe in daunger of some great syck-
nes, of Feuers, payne of the head, and the
Stomacke, then lettynge of blood is not pro-
fitable, pray we to God that all maye be for
the best.

The newe moone shalbe the xiiii. daye at
vii. of the clocke at nighte, in the Sygne of
Cancer, whiche shalbe rayny and frost that
one may not passe on the wayes for thaboun-
dance of Snowe that shall fall, and great
tempestes of wyndes shall be, whiche shall
continue vntyl the fourth daye of this newe
moone.

The fyrste quarter shal be the. xx. daye of
this month, at two of the clocke in the moz-
nyng, whiche shalbe faire weather and con-
stant, but yet some frostes, notwithstanding

of meane temperaunce, God assisting.

The full moone shalbe the. xxiii. day at
vi. of the clocke. vii. minutes of Virgo.

Fulgurations and tempestes with rain and
wynde that shal not be very constant, and
many fluddes shal arise in many Countreys,
so that byldges shalbe raysted vp.

The Prediction of February.

The laste quarter shalbe the. liii. daye at
midnighte, winde of Septentrion that
shal not longe endure. The mariners
shal suffer muche troubles vpon the seas by
reason of the greate tempestes, and muche
treason shal be wrought: but at last it shalbe
known at the pleasure of god our creatoure.

The newe moone shalbe the. vii. daye at.
vi. of the clocke at nyghte great droughte
with darke and cloudy weather, whiche wil
cause some sicknesse to olde persons, if God
of his infinite goodnes do not helpe vs.

The fyfthe quarter the. xix. daye at. ii. of
the clocke in the morninge moyste weather
and hot, and verye dangerous wyndes for
women with chyldre, wherin they shalbe in
muche danger, and muche newes shal be
brought, wherof they shal take little regard:
but yet suche as they loke not for,

which shall be great destruction.

The last quarter shall be the. xvi. day at. 8. of the clocke at night. Earthquakes & greates demolition, with weather moderate and inconstant.

The newe mone shall be the. xxiij. day at. ix. of the clocke in the morninge, a little colde raine with haile and tempestes. Mercury promiseth vs in his constitutions that peace shall be through out many countreys, specially in Normandy, peace and unitie in al places to the pleasure of god our creatour.

The firste quarter the. xxx. day at. v. of the clocke at night. Thunders & moderate heat, and the fluddes shall be of so great abundance that many countreys shall be destroyed and spoiled.

The prediction of August.

The full mone shall be the. vi. day at. vi. of the clocke in the morninge. Changeable & piteous weather, the grayne shall suffer much by the abundance of raine that shall fall.

The laste quarter the. xiiij. day at. xi. of the clocke at night. Thunders and lighnings that shall be damageable for the newe wynes, the frutes of the earth will so multiply, that there

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there shall be great aboumdance by the helpe of God.

¶ The newe moone shall be the. xxiij. day at. vi of the clocke in the morninge, very cloudy weather and much haile, with daungerous windes for y^e augmenting of diseases, which shall multiply if god of his infinite goodnes helpe vs not.

¶ The firste quarter the. xxix. day at. viij. of the clocke. xii minutes at after none, humidie of the braine, paines in the belly, in the stomake, in the headde and the lightes, with agues that shall be verye daungerous for the houre present.

¶ The prediction of September.

The full moone shall be the. v. day of thys month at. viij. a clocke in the morning, moderate rayne which shall be good for the grapes.

¶ The last quarter shall be the. xiiij. day at. viij of the clock at night, much heate and daines of little continuance, the gathering of grapes and making of wine shall be very good, for the rayne will augment them.

apparance that Sommer in his beginnyng
shalbe of such excessiue and ardent heat, that
from the first day of the month to the .xx. day
there shall be suche burning heate that they
shall burne as they go, principally that hea-
uen, and earth, and the sea, and all the ele-
ments mouing so together shalbe conioyned
together to geue a seconde conflagration to
the earth, but the heate shall not be so behe-

Autumne shal begynne the .xiii. day of September, the sunne entringe in the firste point of the signe of Libra .xl. degrees and .vii. minuts the more in .xviii. degrees .xxvi. minuts of Capricorne the which shalbe in his beginning colde and drye, with little raine, beginning of mistes, cloudy

The constitution of Autumne shalbe of suche sodayne mouyng that they shall thinke the beginning of ende is come, and in the tyme of this Autumne takyng the pyncipal and the middle. Wynter shall begyn the .xii. of December, the sunne entering into Capricorne, and .xxv. degrees. lxvi. minutes, the moue at .v. degrees and .viii. minutes of Taurus. Saturne which is occidental and digressing .xix. degrees & .ii. minutes of Aries, the other after theyr order. And because the Sunne, Jupiter, Mars, Venus, & Mercury that is retrograde and occyidental signifyeth vnto vs that the begynnynge of wynter shalbe exceeding colde & humyde, and because Saturne is occidental and constituted in

ted in the first house, maketh the beginning of the moneth and the ende to be extreame tolde and moiste weather, and in the middle some little attempte, but it shal not come to effect, the principall & the ende to be of suche inclemency of great colde with wind, snow, rayne, frost, tempestes mouable, mistes and great mouinges of weather and change participant the beginning of winter to be of furious continuance, of sodayne iudgemente with aboundance of payne in the sydes and spitting of bloud, all difficulties of the ycre, distillatiōs reumatike, paines in the raines, priuy paynes in the sides, paines of the sides and of the throte, innumerable spices of Calfarres and other incommodities, the payne in the sides shall last vntil the ende of winter with the paine in the eyes, taking some parte of the spring tide, which wil cause the spoyle and death of many great personages of great estate: Let vs pray to the great god eternal that it would please him to mitigate the greate influence which the starres dothe threaten to vs, and shewing vs of such signes to come, neuerthelesse the starres are subiect to god, and all muste holde together, and so doing of corne and wine we shall haue plenty this present ycare, for the which we must pray to him that it would please him to de-

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fende and kepe vs from euill fortunes, and to kepe the prynces in loue and peace together. God graunte it througħ his grace and mercy. Amen.

The prognosticatio of the Sunne.

When the sunne shalbe at hys rising couerid with a cloude the winge the middes of his body, is signe of raine. Whē in the morning it is hanging in a cloude after the day bryake is past it is signe of haile at his going downe, and if it be full of coulers, the blew signifieth rayne. Redde as fyre signifyeth wynde, but if it be myngled with coulers fieri, signifieth tempestes after the opinion of Virgill, and contrary wise if it be cleare at his rising as at his setting, it is assurance of fayre weather. Also after the opinio of Aristotle when the wynd bloweth out of the same places where the Sunne cometh out or goeth in, it is signe of fayre weather the next day.

The prognostication of the Moone.

The newe Moone blacke and darke doth signifye rayne, and redde is sygne of wynde,

of Nostradamus.

winde, but at the .iiii. day if it be cleare and brighte and his corners sharpe, that is signe of fayre weather not onely for that day, but for all the rest of the month, after Virgill, & after Ptolemy. Regarde these .iii. examples on wynde, and consider one with an other.

Other prognostications.

Ther Significations you maye talke of thinges infinite, gathered together by Pyphus: but yet euil inoughe resolved, whiche layinge on the crowne without sayinge any worde. These significatiōs of Virgill is for the winde and whan the Sea swelleth, or whan on heareth the noyse of woodes & mountaynes, and whē the waues of the water do crye and roare by the sides, and whē the foules of the Sea is walkinge and playeng vpon the sandes, and when the Hearon forsaketh the marshes and flieth a losse in the ayre, and whē the starres fall from the element, and when we shall se the smal leaues flic by the earth, these are signes of raine, and when the thrusshes flynge out of the valleys, and cattel suffering sharpe weather, and the swallow flitenge about the lakes, and the frogges lying by the water bymmes, the Raynebowe in

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the ayre, the fleyng of the Rauens and that returne scedyng on the grasse, the Crowe calling the rayne with hye voyce, walking alone vpon the sandes, and the oyle of lampes wyll take no lychte, and for fayre weather the starres shyneth bryght, and the Rauens beyng amased for gladnesse, and two or thre other foules cryng with open throte syttyng vpon the boughes of trees: Virgyl sayth that it is not Diuinitie that is in him: Also for feelyng the operation of the ayre agood reason, that is not lyke the other foules: and so we must reade *Diuinius et facti*:

What we maye haue our course to make an ende. Wherefore we must all submyt our selues to Goddes myghte, in whome is all the knowledge of the worlde, and that it wolde please hym of hys grace to preserue vs from all euyl fortune.

Our lord neuer spake the thing but that was trew, as he saith in his Gospell, That al them which come vnto me shal not be turned away, There shall be an ende through the world as well the men as the women: The fyfthe

and the fowles, the weather, the wynde, the rayne and the waters runnyng, and al other thynges: and knowinge the departyng of al thynges in the worlde shall haue, and haueinge parte of the thynges that man shall haue, beyng partakers of the sayth of Iesus Chryst, And the same very reason wherfore and when oure lord god formed Adam and Cue: geuyng to them faythe, and sayinge all thynges vpon the earthe are thyne onely except the lyfe of Paradyse, and commaunded them to beware howe to set their hands vpon the same, & know that all other thynges are thyne. Adam losse the fayth when he set his hande vpon the tree which the lord had forbidden him and copared vnto him it was a thing aproued that the thynges of the earth were to him obeysaunt and was all alonge, but not altogether his sayth, but it was of those thynges earthly that the fleshe of his bodye did sweate for. And when the Jewes layd their handes vpon Iesu Chryst they lost their heritage. And ye shall vnderstand that when fayth shall go and fayle them, he will punishe them with want of earthly thynges as he dyd the chyldren of Israell when they went in the wildernesse, at that houre when they fayled of their sayth they fayled also of their fode, and when they asked mercy of our

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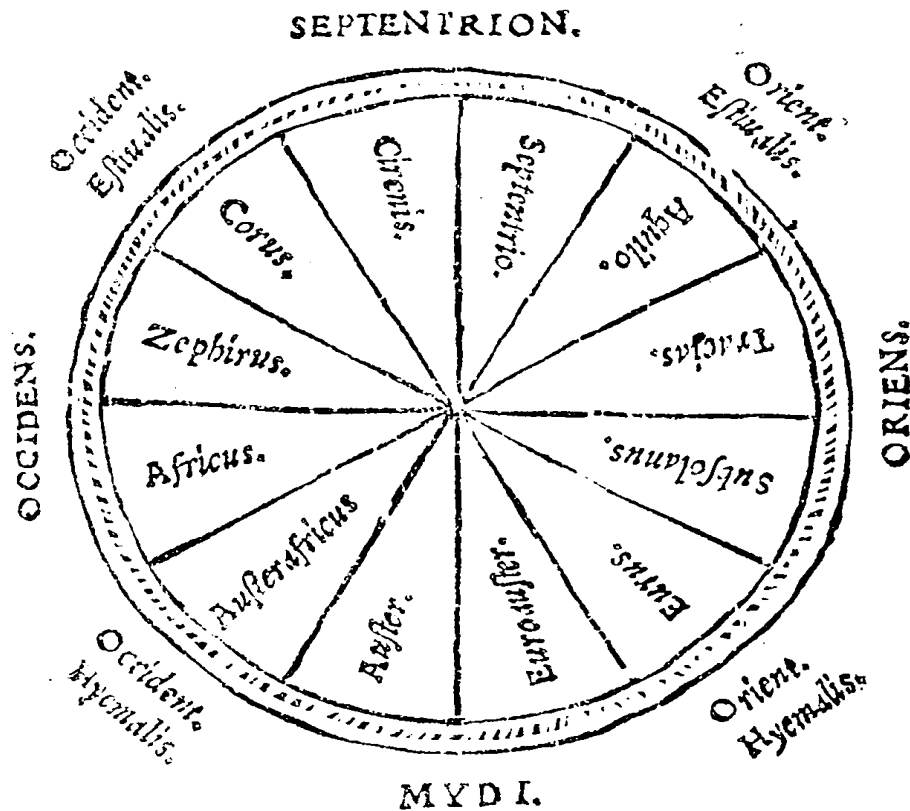

B In this little treatyse & figure you may
vnderstande the situacion of the win-
des, their natures and complexions, in
lyke maner those that be altogether contra-
ry. Arystotle dothe shewe vs in his seconde
boke

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booke of *Metheores* the .6. chapter. sayeth that wind is an exhalation hot and dry, engēdzed of cōcauitie of earth, and the same procedeth of the earth, and is moued in the ayze out of diuers partes of the earth and is called wind, hauing many names and diuerse qualittes. Ptholome sayth it is exhalacion of wynd so caste and moued, and it is so behemente and strong that not only stoncs and trees it doth rayse and caste dolone, but also it troubleth the ayze and moueth the seas to the bottome and maketh the earth to tremble. *Vis eius tanta est non solum saxa et arbores euellat, sed etiam terramq; et celum conturbet ut maria commoueat.* And for more easie vnderstanding the situacion complaytions nature of the sayde windes, I haue set forth this figure, by the which hauyng aduertisement you may the better come to the knowledgc of the qualittes, complexions and natures of the sayde windes, to the whych the aunciente and discrete saylers haue imposed their proper names to the number of 12, but yet there is moze then 12 but these 12 are sufficient to make their nauigatiōs & trafficks, of the which there are four cardinales to vnderstande the pyncipalles, and the rest are other sortes of windes, of the which as sayth Apian in his booke of Cosmography that the other winde meridionall is one of the pyncipalles,

palles which is hot and moyst of his nature resembling the nature of mylke and bloud, and the same is called of the aūcient saylers Auster, *ab hauriendo aquas.* for this same Auster bringith great raynes and nourisheth great clowdes, and engendzeth plagues and other multitudes of sicknesses, and the contrary opposite to this Auster is Septentrion. *Largas nutrit nubes, et letissimas pluuias facit, et pestem gignit. Sic Septentrio aquas stringit, nubes dissipat et pestilentiam repellit.* And euery one of these 4 windes pyncypall hauing two boysterous windes. The auster winde pyncypall hath on his ryghte hande *Euro auster*, and on his left hande *Auster affricus*, which like wise are hot and milde, but neuer the lesse Auster is pyncipall and moze hot in tempestes, wherfoze they be corruptible and not holsome. Auster is also called *Euro* by auncient saylers, because he hauing on the one parte *Eurus*, & on the other *Austrum*: *Auster affricus*, for it is ioyned one syde Auster and the other syde Affrycke. The quarter of the winde pyncypall is *Septentrio* opposite, and contrary wyse Auster be called contraries: *Quia eorum nature & complectiones sunt contra a se: because their nature and complexions be contrary, and when one of them bloweth he wyll not suffer thother to blowe, sed valentior debilliori obuiatur violentiamq; infert & ipsum cessare cogit,* in suche wyse

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that the stronger dothe repulse & beat downe the weaker, so that the stronger cōstraineth the feble and weake to cease: *se sumull flare non permittunt.* For naturally they be appositives and colde and drye of nature, compared to earthe melancolike with cloudes and rayne colde and drye, frostes and snowe and hol- some keepinge safe the flowres and frutes of the earthe *Dicitur Septentrio eo quod a circulo septem stellarum consurgit.* And as I haue befoze sayde that one of the foure pꝛincipall wyndes ha- uynge two wyndes ioyned collateral, ther- foze Septentrion hathe on the ryghte syde *aquilo* holding his nature of Septentrion not yeldynge any raine, but in sommer causeth lyghtnyng and thunder: and in wynter it causeth drye frostes, *tamen non discutit nubes sed constringit,* and for that cause he hath geuen hym the fourme of a deuyll. *Qui ab iniquitatis frigore gentilium corda constringit.* *Circius* at the lefte hande which causeth likewise in Sommer froste, lyghtnyng, thunderyng and tempest, and in winter snow. We haue hereafter to declare the nature situatiō and complexions of two other pꝛincipall wyndes, which are lykewise Diametrially contrary and opposite, by rea- son of their nature, situations and complex- ions, as I haue playnely declared of the o- ther two wyndes, that is to witte *Auster* and *Septen-*

Septentrio. Ab ortu autem equinoctialis fiat subsolanus.

The pꝛincipall Orientall or Easte winde of his nature resembleth to the nature of cole- ricke fyre, neuerthelesse temperate, swete, a- miabile and subtile, and strengthneth the bo- dies of them that be in health, & so byngeth forth flowers. *Et vocatur subsolanus eo quod sub ortu solis nascitur.* For it riseth from whence the sun riseth, and therfoze *Apian* in his booke of Cos- mography in the place befoze alcedged, saith. *Quod est calidus & siccus temperatus suavis purus & subtilis nutrit nubes & cum hoc corpora in sanitate custodit & flores produxit est enim curus subsolano in Parte dextra iuncius.* The which is warme & drie, although lesse then the subsolent apꝛoching to the tēperate blowing aboue with noyse engēdyng rainy cloudes. *Et vocatur curus eo quod ab oriente fiat,* his cō- trary is *Corus*, an occidentall or west wind, of the other syde is the orient of winter, at the lefte hande is *Tracius* so called of the aunciēts, the which is of a warme and drie qualitie, it is very properly wher the sun in sommer doth rise, and *Apian* saith in the place befoze alled- god. *Quod est solstitialis estiuus cuncta discians.* And like- wise he bloweth with noyse and hath for his opposite and contrary *Africus* an Occidentall wynd, and the opposite wind of subsolent is *Zephus* a pneumatick Orientall wind, and he in greke *appellatus est Zepirus, eo quod flores & germina eius facit.*

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eius flatu vivificantur. For it is the beginning of the cumming forth of flowers, and the ende of coldnes, for we say. *Que ab austro flores soluntur et a Zephiro junt.* That is to say that *Auster* destroyeth the flowers, & *Zephirus* bringeth the forth, notwithstanding he engendzeth sycknesses, raine, lightning and thüder, for this cause I say with *Ptholomee.* *Frigora relaxat flores educit morbos pluuias et sonitus tonitruorum facit.* And these collate rall windes to wit *Africus* at the right hand, & is properly the occident of winter, & *Corus* at the left hand, the which is properly the occidēt of somer apzoching greatly to the nature of *Zephirus* their principall wind, for all thze engender raine, tempest, thunder & lightning, yet *Corus* blowing a loft is moze hurtful, for he is corruptible and pestiferous, thus maye you vnderstand by this little figure here set, the situacion, cōplexions and natures of the xii windes wherof I haue made mencion in this little treatise, and to be hozt, remēber, *Quod australes sunt calidi boreales sunt frigidi, Orientales minus australibus calidi, occidentales minus borealibus frigidi.* That is to say, that the South wind is hot, and the North wynde is coloe, and the East wind is lesse hot then the South, & the West wynde is lesse coloe then the North.

Nowe for to finde what planet rayneth in the houre and day that you would, take the letter which signifyeth your daye, and come downe alonge till you be right againste the houre that you would know (the which you shal finde as it is said in the first colunne) the marke

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marke which you finde signifieth the Planet that rayneth, and so muste you rule it from day to daye, and from one houre to an other successiuelly for euer and euer.

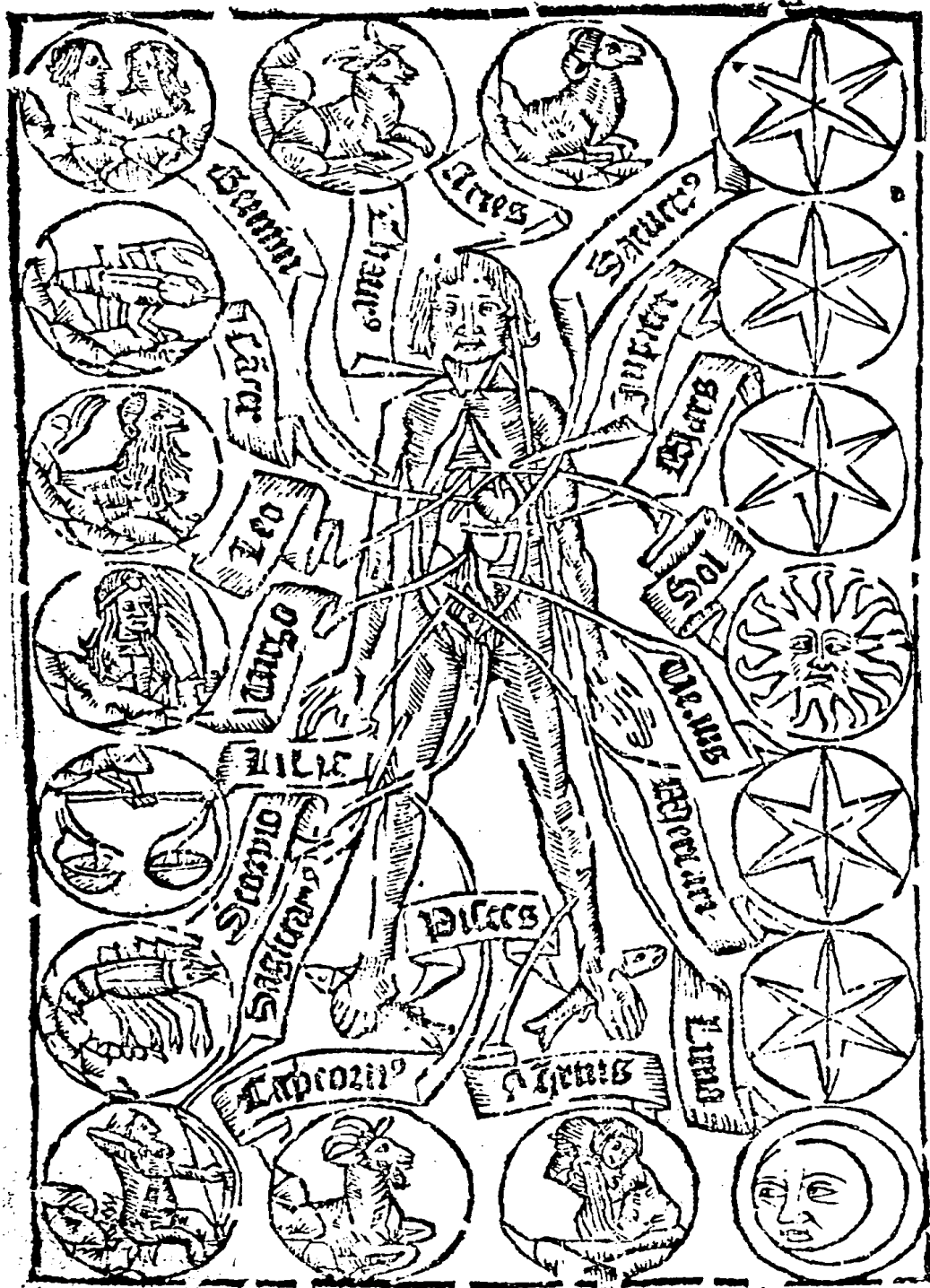
